What is Open Enrollment for Health Insurance?

Open enrollment is the time each year when you can sign up for or switch health insurance plans.

Applies to you if you are not covered through your job, Medicaid, or other programs.

Limited time window to purchase insurance coverage for 2020.

What are the deadlines for sign-up?

For most states, Open Enrollment ends on

December 15, 2019

Coverage begins January 1, 2020

BUT

There are **exceptions**...

Dollars and Cents

Getting covered can be *easier* and *more affordable* than you think.

Some people qualify for tax credits that **reduce their monthly premium to \$0** (zero dollars) per month.

More than eight out of 10 people who enroll through HealthCare.gov qualify for financial help.

The tax credit available through HealthCare.gov reduces most people's premium cost to a total of \$50 to \$100 per month.

Why is it important to get covered?

No one plans to get sick or hurt, but it happens.

Health insurance from <u>HealthCare.gov</u> protects you and your family members from the unexpected.

What is the value of a HealthCare.gov plan?

Free preventive care:

All plans at HealthCare.gov cover free preventive care with no co-pay. This means free cancer screenings, checkups, and more.

Protections for people with pre-existing conditions:

Millions of Americans with no longer have to worry about being denied coverage or charged more due to their health status.

Comprehensive coverage:

These health plans are required to cover ten categories of essential benefits – including emergency services, maternity, mental health, and prescription drug coverage. [https://www.getamericacovered.org/]
